Recap from Last Week

<u>The Senate Select Committee on Empowering Parents and Children (EMPAC)</u> heard **SB 1203 (Coleman)** on Wed 3/13. This would require DEI materials to be posted for parents. In addition to a potential chilling effect on instruction, the AG would have not only enforcement powers but also review powers. *We oppose this bill*.

<u>The House Elections/Elected Officials Committee</u> heard **SJR 74 (Coleman)** on Wed 3/13 and met overwhelming opposition changing the Initiative Petition process; only around 3% of the over 800 submissions in person and/or online were in support. In addition, the bill sponsor called on the House to restore the ballot candy including an already existing citizenship requirement and precluding foreign intervention. She also expended some of her political capital by suggesting she would a procedural move, calling the previous

question, to pass the bill. This action is considered a last resort option in the Senate and led to an early adjournment following filibuster on Wednesday afternoon. We oppose this bill.

<u>The House Administrative Oversight Committee</u> returned HBs 1851 (P. Brown) and 2184 (Haffner) back to the House Elementary and Secondary Committee. As of publication, HB 2184 is the only on the agenda. This is little used action is employed to have the committee amend a bill. In this case, it is likely hoped that the bills will be combined. We support HB 1851.

<u>The Senate Third read and passed SB 727 (Koenig).</u> This bill will move to the House after Spring Break. It started as a tax credit voucher bill that included charter expansion, but a Senate substitute was offered, amended and passed that has turned it into a 167 page education omnibus. It includes

- Teacher pay
- Virtual schools
- Suicie prevention
- Length of school week
- Elementary literacy
- School board vacancies
- PSRS
- Homeschool activities
- Recovery high schools
- Online certification
- Voucher tax credits
- Charter Expansion to Boone County

We oppose this bill.

The House assigned two bills to the Special Committee on Educational Reform. The committee will hear HBs 2937 and 2938 (Davidson) on Mon, Mar 25 at 4:30 pm. These bills are scheduled for Monday, Mar 25 at 4:30 pm.
